Program Highlight

Bioethics and Humanities Seminar

The Bioethics and Humanities Seminar is an elective 1 credit hour course offered during the Fall Semester that introduces students to topic areas and themes that are central to bioethics and humanities in the context of medicine. The course provides "breadth" through the number of topic areas it covers, and it offers opportunities for "depth" through the quality of its required readings and the dialogue afforded by small-group discussion.

The Seminar is limited to 15 students in order to create a setting that is conducive to engagement by all participants. Priority for enrollment will be given to medical students who are enrolled in the *Humanities Distinction Track* at the CCOM, then to other CCOM medical students, and then to other students at the University of Iowa by permission of the Course Co-Directors.

In particular, we assist clinical investigators in identifying and addressing the ethical challenges that frequently arise when designing or conducting research with human subjects. These include ethical challenges in sampling design; randomized and placebo-controlled studies; participant recruitment and informed consent; return of individuallevel research results; community engagement processes; and more. 
