This month: student access, leadership, academic proposals & patient build

- We worked hard this month developing the infrastructure needed to meet an aggressive deadline for granting emrU access for 400 new students and 50 additional faculty members. After training, this interprofessional group will login to the system for the first time in January. Grateful acknowledgements follow this section.
- Continuing the tradition of excellence at Iowa, we are one of the leading schools to use electronic medical record (EMR) simulation in our curriculum. Furthermore, we are one of the first – if not the first – school to also integrate electronic medical records across the breadth of our health science campus.
- To share our experiences and promote this cutting-edge educational tool, we submitted two proposals to the Group on Information Resources – a subgroup of the American Association of Medical Colleges (AAMC):
 - First – a panel of schools using EMRs in their curriculums. If our proposal is accepted, we will take the stage with University of Florida Health and Ohio State University and share:
 - Development timeline
 - Common best practices
 - Governance and resources utilized
 - Second – a poster showcasing The University of Iowa’s success and educational outcomes with emrU.

- The end of the semester is upon us and it’s time to finish up curriculum development for January and February. Please remember to start integrating emrU into your curriculum early; the emrU patient build process requires a completed patient template one month before emrU is needed in the classroom.
